STELLA is an ancient township and gives its name to an ecclesiastical parish, formed August 8, 1845, from the parishes of Ryton and Winlaton, on the south bank of the River Tyne and on the road from Newcastle to Hexham, and includes Blaydon (which is given under a separate heading) and Derwenthaugh, and is I mile west from Blaydon station on the Newcastle and Carlisle section of the North Eastern railway and 5 west from Newcastle, in the Chester-le-Street division of the county, east division of Chester ward, Gateshead union and petty sessional division, Newcastle county court disand petty sessional division, Newcastie county court district, rural deanery of Chester-le-Street and archdeaconry and diocese of Durham. It is governed by the Blaydon Urban District Council. The church of St. Cuthbert is locally in Blaydon, under which place full particulars will be found. The living was constituted a rectory June 5, 1866. The Catholic church, dedicated to St. Mary and St. Thomas Aquinas, is a building of stone in the Cothic style avected in 1882; the older is right; come and St. Thomas Aquinas, is a building of stone in the Gothic style, erected in 1831: the altar is richly ornamented, and the windows are stained, including one erected in 1906 to commemorate the fifty years of priesthood of the Rev. Canon Wrennall; the rectory attached is in the same style of architecture. A cemetery of 4 acres was formed in 1870 at Blaydon, at a cost of Co. 600 and extended at a cost of Co. 60 £2,600, and extended at a cost of £5,000 in 1900; there are two mortuary chapels. The cemetery is under the control of a Burial Board of 9 members. Stella Hall,

the seat of Joseph Cowen esq. is a fine old gabled building of stone, pleasantly situated, the north front overlooking the Tyne, and commanding extensive views of the surrounding country; it formerly belonged to the Benedictine nuns of Newcastle, and was subsequently the seat of the Tempests. The Ecclesiastical Commissioners are lords of the manor. The Towneley family are the chief landowners. The soil is sand and loam; subsoil, various. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and potatoes. The area is 290 acres; rateable value, £4,321; the population in 1901 was 822 in the township, and 9,315 in the ecclesiastical parish.

DERWENTHAUGH is a hardet 21 miles east, on the south bank of the Tyne. The names of residents are given with Swalwell.

STILLINGTON parish was formed by Order in Council, May 31, 1872, and comprises the township of Stillington, formerly belonging to the parish of Redmarshall, and the township of Whitton, formerly belonging to the parish of Grindon. The township of Foxton-cum-Shotton, in the parish of Sedgefield, was also included within the new parish of Stillington, for ecclesiastical purposes, by Order in Council, July 15, 1886. Stillington station is 1 mile north-east from the village, in Stillington township, on the Stockton and Ferryhill branch of the North Eastern railway and is 5 miles south from Sedgefield and 240 from way and is 5 miles south from Sedgeneid and 240 from London; the parish is in the South Eastern division of the county, petty sessional division and county court district of Stockton-on-Tees, union of Sedgefield, rural deanery of Stockton, archdeaconry of Auckland and diocese of Durham. The church of St. John, locally at Carlton Iron Works in the township of Whitton, was erected in 1879, at a cost of £2,800, and consecrated by Bishop Lightfoot in Iron 1882; it is an addition of red brick in the Cothic in June, 1880; it is an edifice of red brick in the Gothic style, from designs by Messrs. Alexander & Henman, architects, of Stockton and Middlesbrough, and consists of nave, south aisle, small transept used as a vestry, of nave, south aisle, small transept used as a vestry, organ chamber, south porch, and a tower, with spire containing one bell: there are 303 sittings. The register dates from the year 1872. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £230, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Durham, and held since 1891 by the Rev. Firth Newsome, of St. Aidan's. The vicarage house, which adjoins the church, was erected in 1884 at a cost of £1.250, of which amount £600 was granted by the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty and the balance raised by subscription. Here is a Catholic chapel, served from St. Mary's Stockton-on-Tees. The whole of the from St. Mary's Stockton-on-Tees. The whole of the

township of Stillington is owned by the Warden and Fellows of Merton College, Oxford. The soil is clay; subsoil, clay and gravel. The chief crops are oats, barley and potatoes. The area is 1,153 acres; rateable value, £8,752; the population in 1911 of Stillington was 87 in the township and 1,261 in the ecclesiastical parish.

FOXTON and SHOTTON form a township, 3 miles south of Sedgefield, and 2 miles north-west from Stillington station on the North Eastern railway; for ecclesiastical purposes the township was in 1886 united to Stillington. Viscount Boyne is the sole landowner. It contained a population in 1911 of 61; area, 1,803 acres; rateable value, £1,493.
